## John Ferguson Biography

John Ferguson was born in London, and before coming to Australia, worked as a Musical Director for theatres, brass bands and choirs, as well as some arranging and conducting for Television South West (TSW) and Thames Television, London.

As a conductor, John studied with Dr Roy Truby in the UK, and with Robert Rosen, Myer Fredman and Barry Bignell. He holds a Master's degree in conducting from the Victorian College of the Arts in Melbourne, and a PhD from the University of Melbourne. In 2001 he received a Symphony Australia scholarship to study with Jorma Panula, and later a scholarship to the International Conducting Academy in Romania. Past engagements have included conducting the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra strings, the Tasmanian Discovery Orchestra, the Australian Discovery Orchestra and engagements in Singapore as well as Shanghai, Nanjing and Beijing in China, including being guest conductor for the Xiamen International Piano Festival in 2016 and for a tribute concert for Chu Wanghua with the Xiamen Philharmonic in 2019. John also worked as a conductor for the VCA Opera School for four years, notably conducting Dvorak's Rusalka in 1999. Other operatic experience includes conducting for Melbourne City Opera and





Gilbert and Sullivan Opera Victoria. In 2007 he conducted the Yellow River Concerto with the distinguished Chinese pianist Yin Chengzong, and the world premiere of Chu Wanghua's 'Silk Road' symphony, broadcast throughout China by China Central Television. John has received the Theatre Guild 'Musical Director of the Year' award three times and was made a life member of the Gilbert and Sullivan Society in 2017.

John is regularly invited to adjudicate festivals and eisteddfods, has been an AMEB examiner since 1988, and has been a guest lecturer at Beijing and Chengdu Normal Universities and the Tianjin, Xiamen and Sichuan Conservatories in China. Dr Ferguson has undertaken musicology research at the University of Melbourne in recent years, as well as being Director of Music at Scotch College, a position he has held since 1991.

### Scotch College Music School

Music is a vital part of the life of Scotch. Over 1000 individual lessons are taught each week by some 70 specialist instrumental teachers. There is a full 85 piece symphony orchestra, five symphonic bands, four stage bands, an intermediate orchestra, three string orchestras, a junior choir, full choir, chamber choir, and a number of vocal ensembles. Additionally there is a plethora of smaller groups, jazz and chamber ensembles, as well as a Military and Pipe Band. There is also a thriving Rock Band program.

All boys receive some instrumental tuition during their time at Scotch, and also sing in the Foundation Day Concert, presented at Hamer Hall, in their senior years.

Computers play a significant part in modern music education. Boys in Years 7 and 8 spend part of their class music time in a music computer laboratory designed to allow boys greater creative expression through musical composition, and many boys use the music computers for advanced composition, aural training and arranging.

Scotch has a proud tradition of nurturing individual student excellence, and is well aware of its responsibilities to exceptional boys, as well as the need to challenge the boys who do not necessarily wish to aspire to such heights. The Symphony Orchestra generally performs at least one full symphony every year, and, to feature advanced students, will often accompany seven or eight fully rehearsed concertos a year, spread across a number of concerts.

Past concerto performances have included piano concertos by Tchaikovsky, Rachmaninov (Numbers 1, 2 and 3), Grieg, Saint-Saëns, Mozart, Beethoven, as well as violin concertos by Tchaikovsky, Mendelssohn, Saint-Saëns, Bruch, Mozart, Bach, Vivaldi, Sarasate, Sibelius and Brahms, as well as many concerto performances for other instruments.

We are fortunate to be able to welcome local and international guest artists to work with our students. Past visitors include Sir Neville Mariner as guest conductor for the Scotch College Symphony Orchestra, as well as Barry Tuckwell and James Morrison.

In addition to the College Symphony Orchestra, there is Pro-Musica; an affiliated chamber orchestra comprising staff and other professionals, as well as giving some advanced students an opportunity to perform in a professional context in a 'mentor' situation.

Pro-Musica sometimes accompanies outstanding student soloists – particularly for events such as the biennial Piano Festival.

In the same way as Pro-Musica, the superb choir, Concordis provides senior advanced voice students and former students, an opportunity to continue singing in a highly focussed environment. This mixed choir essentially comprising university students, was founded by Scotch Choral Director, Andrew Hunter. It has enjoyed success in national competitions and is currently the ABC Victorian Choir of the Year. In 2013 the Old Scotch Symphony Orchestra was formed. It presents two major concerts a year, and in addition combines with Concordis for a Christmas concert.

Chamber music has featured prominently for many years, with some having been broadcast locally by 3MBS and nationally a number of times by the ABC. The annual Chamber Music Dinner features our most advanced ensembles and is one of the highlights of the music school calendar.

In 2004, Scotch made a formal arrangement with the Specialist Music school affiliated to

the Shanghai Conservatorium. We have had students visit the Shanghai School, and have also had Shanghai students visit us and perform both to and with our students for a week of intense musical study. More recently, a similar arrangement has been made with the Tokyo College of Music.

The ensembles, particularly the orchestra, tour regularly. In recent years our musicians have performed in England, France, Belgium, China, Taiwan, Malaysia, Hong Kong, Singapore, Zimbabwe, Spain and the USA.

A number of Scotch students continue their music studies beyond school - some becoming famous such as Jazz legend Graeme Bell, the contemporary musician Felix Riebl of the Cat Empire, as well as classical musicians such as pianists Ian Munro, Cameron Roberts, James Brawn, conductor Warwick Stengards, composer Nicholas Buc and French Horn virtuoso, Lin Jiang. Some of our more recent students have continued their studies overseas at institutions such as Royal Academy of Music and the Royal Northern College of Music in the UK, to Stuttgart in Germany and to the Julliard School in New York, including pianist Max Foster who won the ABC Symphony Australia Young Performer of the Year while still in year 11.

Scotch has a thriving Jazz program. Many students participate in small jazz ensembles, studying demanding skill of improvisation. Our Show Band has enjoyed great success at the national Generations in Jazz festival, twice coming first in Victoria and second nationally in the first division. The annual Jazz Cabaret is a popular highlight, and always features distinguished guest artists who work and perform with the boys.

In 2006, we introduced a visiting performers' program called ScotchArts. This program

brings top quality Australian and international musicians and ensembles to work with our students, and perform in our auditorium, the Ian Roach Hall. Artists have included Taik Oz, The Song Company, The Idea of North, Ensemble Liaison, the Flinders Quartet and many others. More recently, Wilma Smith, former concertmaster of the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra, has presented three concerts a year entitled Wilma and Friends. We are pleased to have Wilma as our Chamber Music Artist in Residence.

Our senior students have enjoyed onsistently high VCE results, with students frequently selected to perform for the VCE Top Acts performances, and a number have won Premier's Awards. Some 350 students sit AMEB examinations annually, sometimes with as many as 20 students achieving diplomas in a single year.

However, music is for everyone, not just our exceptional boys. Most important of all is the bond that develops among musicians, and the enhanced quality of life that results from an understanding and appreciation of music. It is this philosophy that is the driving force of music at Scotch.

### Soloists

#### Leon Fei LMusA (Violin)

Born in Melbourne, Leon Fei began violin at the age of five. He studies with Dr. Robin Wilson, Head of Violin at the Australian National Academy of Music and previously learnt from Mark Mogilevski.

Praised for his "rich and expansive tone" and "generous musical personality" as well as his "passion, excitement, coloured melodical lines and brilliant technique" (The Age 2022), Leon has won numerous international and national competitions including the 2021 LIMSA International Music Competition in the USA, the 2020 Melbourne Recital Centre's Bach Competition. 2019 Preston Symphony Orchestra Youth Concerto Competition & Audience Prize, 2018 3MBS "The Talent", the 2017 Hephzibah Menuhin Award for Strings, 2017 AUSTA Paul McDermott Scholarship for Violin, and the 2016 Brisbane International Youth Music Competition. In November 2017, at the age of 13, Leon became the youngest ever winner of the prestigious Australia music prize, Australia National Fine Music Young Virtuoso Award of the Year, following his winning of 2017 3MBS Fine Music Young Performer Award and Audience Choice Award.

In 2019 at the age of 14 Leon performed as a soloist with the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra at Melbourne's Sidney Myer Music Bowl. He has also performed in Carnegie Hall in New York after winning the 1st prize & "Judges Favourite Award" in the 2015 American International Protégé Music Competition, at the age of 10.

In 2022, Leon performed Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto in D major with Corpus Medicorum Symphony Orchestra, as part of the 3MBS 10<sup>th</sup> Year Anniversary Tchaikovsky Marathon at Melbourne Recital Centre, and gave a recital with pianist Rhodri Clarke for the Australian Digital Concert Hall.



Leon has also appeared as a soloist in Hamer Hall in Melbourne, Queensland Performing Arts Centre, Melbourne Recital Centre, as well as featuring on 3MBSFM Radiothon and on Australia's ABC Television. In 2021 Leon participated in the Keshet Eilon International String Mastercourse studying with Itzhak Rashkovsky and Shmuel Ashkenasi.

Leon has been a keen member of several chamber music ensembles in Melbourne, including the Scotch College Horn Trio, who won the Bendigo Chamber Music Festival Prize in the 'Lockdown Legends' 2020 Strike a Chord Championship. Leon has also participated in Australia Chamber Orchestra Academy Program in 2020 and Australia Youth Orchestra Program in 2022. Leon was awarded A.Mus.A at the age of 11 and L.Mus.A at 14 for violin, both with Distinction. He is also an accomplished pianist.

Leon plays a fine J.B Vuillaume violin made in 1863, on loan from a generous benefactor.

### Soloists



#### Jun Gardiner AMusA (Cello)

Jun Gardiner was born in Melbourne in 2010 and showed great interest in music from an early age. He began learning the cello with Suzuki music teacher Takao Mizushima in Sydney at the age of 5. Jun currently studies under Michael Dahlenburg, who is the cellist in the Australian String Quartet.

Jun was awarded AMEB AMusA with Distinction at age 11 and has won a number of local and international competitions. Jun was awarded 1st Prize and Category Winner, Prize of Mayor of the city of Jihlava for the best competitor under 15 years of age and Prize for the interpretation of a composition by Samuel Barber in Gustav Mahler Prize Cello Competition 2022. He also won 1<sup>st</sup> Cello Category 1 in the New Zealand International Young Talent Music Competition 2020/21.

In 2022 at age 12 Jun won 1<sup>st</sup> place Musical Society of Victoria String Solo 18 years and under and recently won 1<sup>st</sup> place in the Boroondara Eisteddfod 2022 String Solo Open section. Jun appeared in the 2021 3MBS The Talent and received the Audience Prize and the 1<sup>st</sup> prize in The Talent 2022. Jun performed as a soloist with Melbourne Chamber Orchestra at the Melbourne Recital Centre in 2019 and is an active member of the Scotch College Symphony Orchestra and Scotch Junior School Music Captain 2022.

#### Xavier Tang AMusA (Saxophone)

Xavier is Captain of Choir at Scotch College. He has been under the tutelage of Peter Mander for voice since he was 9 years old. Xavier was the youngest student ever to be invited to join the senior Chamber Choir and since has enthralled many with his strong tenor voice with solos in the school play and choral concerts. In 2022 he was awarded the Betty Mander award for singing.

Xavier is an accomplished pianist and has won numerous prizes at competitions including the Majella Drew piano award.

Xavier's other love is the Saxophone and achieved his Associate of Music with Distinction in 2021 and was awarded the Howard Belling award in Jazz Studies in 2022.

He hopes to continue to combine his singing and saxophone with his studies in law at university. In his spare time Xavier enjoys scouring obscure music shops around the world for vintage vinyl recordings.






